How does a High Quality Early Childhood Program support students in Keller ISD?

Produces 10-16% rate of return

 Adults command higher income, better health, and less likely to be arrested

- 40% less likely to see retentions and special education referrals
- 30% more likely to graduate from high school

 Better language skills, social skills, fewer behavioral problems, and better reading skills





ELC Trend Data


